Biology Set: Blh

Aurelia has completed class work and assignments efficiently and used correction periods effectively to clarify her knowledge. Her independent learning skills are very well developed, and she makes effective use of the course materials to practise new knowledge so that she is able to perform well in tests. Practical work this term has included an investigation into the sensitivity of E. Coli to antibiotics using aseptic techniques and Aurelia was eventually able to achieve satisfactory results after some misunderstanding of the written instructions. Her early departure for the Easter break will require high levels of self-motivation and good communication skills to ensure that her learning is not adversely affected. The end of year exam will help to inform a predicted grade for university applications: reviewing feedback from past tests and assignments to target weaker areas first for revision may help Aureila to perform as well as she can.
